Celebrating Christmas on Cockatoo Country


Almost a hundred years ago, Biloela was established on Gangalu Country, about 120 kms west of Gladstone, as the administration centre for businesses of the Banana Shire. It's generally accepted that the word 'Biloela' was derived from an Indigenous word for white cockatoo and images of these flighty characters are often used to represent the area. Geographically, Biloela is on the junction of the Burnett and Dawson Highways so it attracts many travellers. On the weekend of 26-28 November, Biloela attracted plenty of Capricornia Register members keen to explore the local area and celebrate another wonderful year of JDCQ friendship and fun with copious Christmas cheer.

Our afternoon visit was to Queensland Heritage Park in Biloela. This complex is something of a landmark due to the towering canvas roof which came from a World expo 88 pavilion. Once we were in the centre, a helpful guide treated us to a fascinating tour that highlighted the pioneering spirit of settler Australians. There was an impressive range of historical motor vehicles as well as motors used for many other purposes. It might be expected that people with a driving passion for the Jaguar marque would not be interested in other motors. However, as we strolled around, the wealth of knowledge members shared about motors in general was extensive - maybe the guide even picked up a few more things to include in his skilfully conducted tours.

Exhibits also included geological displays, including 265 million-year-old fossils found south of Banana. There is a celebration of the multicultural nature of the area and acknowledgement of the rigors of early pioneering life. Most members are old enough to know something of the hardships of life lived before computers, airconditioned Jaguars, clothes dryers and wash-and-wear register regalia. Therefore, these exhibits serve as reminders about how fortunate we all are to live in the 21st Century Australia.

On Sunday morning we found our festive Christmas table transformed for a tasty breakfast before we enjoyed a 65 kms drive in convoy - this time, west to Moura. The area had received plenty of recent rain which, despite the overcast sky, made the scenery particularly fresh and the colours vibrant. Lime green grasses topped with caramel-coloured seed-heads swayed on the verges backed by lush sparsely-treed paddocks. Cattle grazed contentedly – thankfully, even the large, unfenced cattle we had to drive between as we approached a poignant memorial park dedicated to miners that had lost their lives in a 1994 underground coal mine disaster. The heart-felt messages on the headstones were a sobering reminder to members of how significant and loved family and friends are and how suddenly lives can be irreversibly changed.

In stark contrast to the lush scenery enjoyed earlier in the drive as well as to the lovingly tended memorial - approaching the enormous grey, open-cut coal mine evoked an entirely different emotional response. This environment is harsh and the work looks tediously repetitive. Some Indigenous landhealing work is ongoing and, in addition to the mine, was viewed from the platform by members.

Mining was established at Moura in 1961 and in the township, there is another memorial to lives lost in various accidents. We visited this, and a coffee shop, before finishing our end of year and Christmas celebratory weekend with a sausage sizzle in a Moura Park where we also took a novel photo of everyone standing in a huge red coal bucket!

Fabulous weekends such as this become treasured memories for members, all of whom contribute to the synergistic nature of Capricornia Register. Our heart-felt thanks go to all who organised and contributed to make this a unique and diverse weekend enjoyed by all.
