Ahoy!

Listen up me hearties! - and I will tell you about the 13 brave souls of the Brisbane Register who joined together in the face of tumultuous storms whipping up a shark infested ocean to attempt the crossing to St Helena Island in an ancient leaky wooden boat!

Well it sounds like the start

of a good sailor's yarn but in fact it was a beautiful Sunday morn-

ing when we gathered on Newstead House jetty to board the very comfortable "Lady Brisbane". Our most threatening task was to juggle a hot coffee and warm muffin at morning tea.

Setting sail down the Brisbane River our Captain spoke about points of interest along the

way—the first thing being the massive river works to support extra lanes of Kingsford Smith Drive. Fortunately the Gateway Bridge did not collapse as we passed underneath. Its quite a way to the mouth of the river then a further 4 km to St Helena. Here, near where the river enters the bay, in the early 186o's a prison ship was moored. The prisoners were taken each day to St Helena to dig fresh water wells,

cut stone blocks, build a lime kiln and lay the foundations for a planned Quarantine Station. However, Queensland authorities, troubled with chronic overcrowding of Petrie Tce prison and pleased at the abilities and progress of the prisoners on St Helena decided to drop the planned Quarantine Station idea and changed St Helena into a self sustaining prison. The buildings were to be built by the prisoners with stone quarried by the prisoners, food farmed by the prisoners and cooked by the prisoners. So in 1867 St Helena was opened for business and the prisoner number eventually grew to over 300 of Qld's roughest and toughest criminals. But this was no island holiday camp! Punishment was tough and St Helena became know as the "Hell hole of the Pacific".

Our guide Jacob walked and talked us around the island. The graveyard where crosses bore not a name but just a prisoner number. The rail tow path for shifting quarried stone and island produce, the sleeping quarters, the eating quarters, kitchen and separate bakery. The Blacksmith work shop was next door to the punishment yard.

To end his time on the island a prisoner had to serve out his sentence, die or attempt a risky escape. Prison staff kept the sharks frequenting the local waters by feeding them kitchen scraps. In 65 years 25 serious attempts at escape were tried and only 3 people disappeared without trace.

Luckily our fate had a much happier ending. After the obligatory photo stop at the St Helena sign we escaped the island to the comfort of the Lady Brisbane for a well earned Aussie BBQ steak and sausage lunch before proceeding home.



Did You Know.....

SS Jaguar 100

When showing my SS100 at Display Days, I am routinely asked certain questions.

What is an SS100?

To answer this one requires a little knowledge of Jaguar History.

Soon after WW1, a couple of young guys named William Lyons and William Walmsley got into the business of making motorcycle sidecars under the name of Swallow Sidecars. From there they progressed into building smarter looking car bodies on other companies' chassis as Swallow Coachbuilding. By the 1930s they were building complete cars as SS Cars Limited with engines from Standard Motors.



In 1935, notable engineer Harry Weslake was consulted about improving the performance of the engines for SS Cars. The outcome was a change from the old side valve engines to a new overhead valve, pushrod engine with about 40% better horsepower.

A new model name was introduced for the 1936 cars powered by the new engine. Hence the SS Jaguar Saloon, SS Jaguar Open Top Tourer, SS Jaguar Drop Head Coupe and the new SS Jaguar 100.

The SS 100 was intended as a competition sports car with the 100 included in its name to emphasise its top speed, in miles per hour. In 1936 this was a little ambitious with the 2 ½ litre engine then fitted. However, it was bettered in 1938 when a 3 ½ litre engine became an option.

After WW2, the name SS was discarded, and the company became Jaguar.

Is it a real one?

Well, it is not a genuine SS100 built in Coventry. However, my car has a genuine SS 2 ½ litre engine sourced from an SS Jaguar Saloon and bears the chassis number of that car. The body is built in aluminium on timber frame and steel chassis exactly as the genuine cars. I regard it as a perfect clone or true replica.

Where was it made and how did you come to own it?

Most of the fabrication work was done by Finch Restorations in South Australia in the late 1980s.

In 1990, Denis Stone of the Gold Coast saw the project advertised in the Australian Jaguar Magazine.

Denis completed the work, with a view to driving the car in Targa Tasmania. He drove it in Targa a few times, placing second in class in 2002.

By 2010, his need for speed had moved to racing an AC Cobra replica, and so Denis put the car up for auction through Shannons where it failed to meet the reserve. A couple of years later I expressed interest and we agreed a price.

What is it worth?

A real SS Jaguar 100 in similar condition is worth around half a million dollars. I asked Finch Restorations their current price to build an equivalent replica and the answer was around \$300,000 and the parts are now hard to find. Neither Denis nor I paid that much.

What is it like to drive?

It drives like you would expect of a 1936 car. You don't have the braking, power steering or acceleration of a modern car. You need to be good at using an early manual gearbox. You must be very aware of what the fools in modern cars and trucks are doing around you.

There is no avoiding the wind in the hair (and everywhere), so it can be very cold in winter.

However, no modern car can compare with the romance of driving the epitome of the pre-WW2 British sports car with that long louvered bonnet and big headlights. It gets the thumbs up from other drivers, always attracts interest at the petrol servo and as you go by school children call out 'Great Car Mate'.


